What this form is for

This form is for use by recipients of a grant under the Ancillary Dwelling Grants Program. Only submit this form if you are a grant recipient.

By filling out this form you are making a statutory declaration under the *Oaths Act 2001* that you have commenced building works on an ancillary dwelling. This is a requirement for receiving the first of two \$5 000 payments which make up the grant.

How to complete the form

Only one person needs to complete the form.

If the grant was made to one or more individuals, the declaration must be made by one of those individuals. If it was made to a company, the declaration must be made by a director of that company.

To complete the form, print it and fill in the blanks, then have it witnessed by a person authorised to do so. Refer to the list of authorised people on the last page.

How to submit the form

After completing the form and having it witnessed, scan or photograph the declaration. There is no need to include this cover page or the list of authorised witnesses on the last page. You can then submit the declaration through the State Growth grants portal by signing in using the email address and password you used to sign up for the grant.
